Greetings. May mercy, grace, and love be yours in abundance.

A month ago, I was in Salt Lake City attending the 226th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) as a teaching elder (minister) commissioner from Utica Presbytery. Michelle Dolan was the ruling elder commissioner. Each of the 166 presbyteries in the PCUSA sends an equal number of ruling elders and ministers to our biennial gathering. There are also advisory delegates: young adults from the presbyteries, theological students, ecumenical and co-mission workers invited to attend.

All of us were assigned to committees which met via zoom to deliberate and discern the various issues to be later addressed in plenary. I served on the GA Procedures committee; our major task was to review and bring forward to the Assembly the work of a "special committee" to update the standing rules for General Assembly. We might roll our eyes over the number of committees and sigh. Yet, there is something to be said for our form of governance. As the new standing rules state, "The General Assembly is the council of the whole church and is representative of the unity of [the other councils] and congregations of the Presbyterian Church (USA). They go on to note that GA "constitutes the bond of union, community, and mission among all its congregations and councils, to the end that the whole church becomes a community of faith, hope, love, and witness." We lift up and work towards greater unity (which is Christ's gift to the church for all who believe in him as Lord and Savior) and diversity as Paul writes in I Corinthians 12, "Now we are the body of Christ and individually members of it."

Now we may think that a General Assembly is all about resolutions and overtures, Roberts' Rules of Order, convoluted debates, and votes. That is there. But the worship of God is first and foremost. It is central, just as it is for a congregation. For among other things through worship, we encounter Christ in Word and sacrament, God's presence and action in community, hope and yearning together that our mutual witness and work will point to the reign of God.

There was a moment at the Assembly when we were in the midst of a controversial debate over whether the denomination should immediately begin to divest from all companies whose major income comes from fossil fuels. The presiding co-moderator stepped out for a moment and then returned in deep silence. News had just been received: Hurricane Beryl had been upgraded to a Category 5 level as it headed through Grenada towards Jamaica and the Yucatan peninsula. One of our ecumenical delegates was pastor and president of the three congregation Presbyterian denomination in Grenada, a denomination of around 600 members.

At that moment all busyness stopped. And we opened our hearts to God in prayer. We worshiped. The moderator led us in that prayer (as I best remember): "God, only you know...still we ask you, encamp your angels around those as your children live through this....You are still God, all by yourself. We trust you. We believe you are already working this out. So, we say thank you. We are still a praying body and still called to the work of the church for the church. Amen."

The other two core values of the standing rules of the General Assembly are the creation of community and faithful discernment and governance. In months to come, I will share more about these and about the actions of the General Assembly and of the Synod Assembly which takes place this October. For the moment, let me simply add the first words that describe the characteristic of faithful discernment and governance: Reflecting in all things Christ's command to love God and neighbor.

Such foundations are not only for General Assemblies. They are for us too as a congregation. I invite you to pray and consider how we live them and what God is calling us to do in fulfilling them. May we never cease to be a praying body called to the work of the church for the church, called to trust in and witness to the love of Christ, and in word and deed honor all persons and God's creation itself.



News from Building and Grounds
