INTENTIONAL CONVERSATIONS FOR oving tami

Everything should be done in love - 1 Corinthians 16:14 (CEB)

Conversations about faith are important! During the week of Valentine's, discuss ways to show love to your family and others. Don't worry about getting it all correct – just have fun talking and thinking together!

TREE OF LOVE

Print the attached Tree of Love and leave it on the dining room table for your family to discuss this week. Also, gather pencils and colored markers as you fill in the tree.

Read 1 Corinthians 16:14 and discuss the following questions with your family:

- How did our family learn to love? Who showed us how to love? (Family members, a caring friend, watching how another family cares for each other, Jesus caring for people)
- What are some things our family does really well in love for each other? (Empty the dishwasher, use kind words, ask for help, give a hug, listen to each other, laugh together)
- Sometimes, it's really hard to love our family well. What are some ways our family might love each other well when it's harder to love well? (Notice when someone is tired or stressed and offer compassion and grace; take in a deep breath of love/kindness before responding.)
- What are ways our family does well to love others in our community? (Visit an elderly adult, take a neighbor's trash bin to the curb, meet and get to know a new family in the neighborhood or school, invent a creative way to raise funds for a special cause)

On the Tree of Love page, read Psalm 1:2-3. Here, we learn that if we follow God's instructions, we are like a tree planted by the water so it can grow. We love because God tells us through the Bible and Jesus that God loves us, and we need to love others, especially our family.

Pray: God, thank you for giving us this family. Help us to show your love to each other in all we do and say. Amen.

This week, come back to the tree daily as you do anything in love and care for your family or community. Set a goal for each family member to do one or two acts of love daily. Write it in one of the hearts on the tree and then color it with a marker. You might be surprised by just how many ways you show love to others.

PANCAKE DINNER

The weeks of ordinary time that follow Epiphany are coming to an end. Pancake Day, Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday, Carnival, Fastnacht, Shrove Tuesday are all names given to the day before Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. Since Lent is a season of spiritual discipline, penance, fasting, and reconciliation in preparation for Easter, Christians in many places celebrate with merriment and the eating of rich foods, using up eggs, sugar, butter and other dairy products, sweets and meats.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE: MARCH 5, 11:00 AM

We begin our Lenten journey March 5th in the Fellowship Hall with a service of ashes. Ashes are an ancient symbol of repentance and grief and reminder of our mortality. The ashes come from the previous Palm Sunday, framing the season of Lent and bringing to full circle beginning and end, death and life.

PRAYING THE PSALMS

Praying the psalms is an ancient spiritual practice. Dietrich Bonhoeffer titled one of his books, <u>Psalms: The</u> <u>Prayer Book of the Bible</u>. Indeed, he reminds us of "the fact that Jesus died on the cross with the words of the Psalter on his lips." It is through the psalms that we can learn to pray more deeply.

Below is a thirty-day psalter that you are invited to follow or modify as you read and pray through the clusters of psalms, arranged in order from 1 to 150. As you read, reflect or meditate on a word or phrase that leaps out at you. What brings joy or hope and are there passages that are disturbing? Do you find patterns amongst the psalms? What more do you learn about God, and about your relationships with God?

Let opportunities for questions arise as well as a thirst for more exploring and contemplation. (The Religious Study Group as been listening to a biblical scholar talking about the history of the Psalms.) Then, take time to pray in response and open yourself to rest in God's presence. All of this is a particular way of reading Scripture known as lectio divina.

Helpful Information for New York State Seniors

Senior Scam Awareness and Prevention: According to the Better Business Bureau, the age group most susceptible to fraud is 18 - 24 years old, not seniors. The most common scams for seniors involved investments and cryptocurrency.

Watch out for an email or text message that states: "A USPS package has arrived at the warehouse and cannot be delivered due to incomplete address information. Please confirm your address in the link within 12 hours...." **Do NOT click on the link.**

Online Purchase Scams: Please don't buy from Facebook or Instagram. Make sure you are on a safe website. The browser should say https. Look for spelling errors or other red flags. Always pay with a credit card as credit cards offer the greatest form of protection should you encounter a scam. Beware of Phone Fraud: Scammers frequently target by phone. Scammers will claim to be a government agent or pose as a bank employee. Sadly, caller ID's can easily be spoofed. <u>Government agencies DON'T make unsolicited calls.</u> When in doubt, hang up the phone and call the official source to verify unexpected or unusual claims.

You can check business profiles with the Better Business Bureau at BBB.org. To ask questions before hiring a company, if you need assistance filing a complaint, or to share your story, you can call the Upstate NY Better Business Bureau at 518.633.2227 or (800) 828-5000. For the NYS Division of Consumer Protection, go to <u>dos.ny.gov/consumerprotection</u> or call 800-697-1220. You can also log on to the websites of the Better Business Bureau and the NYS Division of Consumer Protection if you want to see what the current scams are. You can reduce the number of unsolicited calls by registering your phone with the Do Not Call registry. If you are on the Do Not Call Registry and continue receiving calls, contact the registry and tell them. donotcall.gov 888-382-1222 (Federal Trade Commission/Do Not Call)

Medicare Fraud Alert: Last Year there was \$60 billion of fraud nationally, \$5 billion in New York State. Beware of Ads on TV concerning Medicare, Medicare Advantage plans, and other medical devices. For example, Joe Namath has been ordered not to be repeating inaccurate information on TV ads. Medical ads cannot offer vague information; they must contain specifics. Be sure to thoroughly investigate any info you see advertised on TV.

NYS Senior Medicare Patrol Presentation on Medicare Card Scams: Scammers are calling, emailing and texting trying to convince beneficiaries that they can get a new Medicare card, and all they need to do is give them their Medicare number. **Scammers may tell you that:**

1. <u>Medicare is issuing an updated or new card</u> - a plastic one, metal one, one with a chip, or even a white and black COVID-19 card, and they need to verify their number.

2. For a new Medicare card, they need to verify info - personal, medical, or financial information.

3. <u>Current Medicare card is expiring, pay a fine if it is not renewed -</u> the paper red, white, and blue card is the only card issued by Medicare.

Why are scammers doing this? They steal your personal information and use the information to get medical treatment, prescription drugs, surgeries, and durable medical equipment (such as wheelchairs, surgical supplies, catheters, and other health equipment) and bill Medicare.

A stolen medical identity is often more valuable than a stolen credit card!

New York StateWide Senior Action Council has a **Patients' Rights Helpline, Medicare/EPIC Counseling Services,** and a helpline for **Medical Fraud.** The number to call is 800-333-4374. I can personally testify to the high quality and helpfulness of this helpline. Last year, I received a **bill for over \$1,000** for services that had previously been covered. I was also billed hundreds of dollars for a bottle of medication that was only partially used. I was leaving the next morning for a three-week ski trip to British Columbia, Canada. From Canada, I called the Helpline. I was willing to do the work, but I didn't know where to start: the hospital? Medicare? Blue Cross? Sarah answered the phone, listened, and offered to handle it! Three days later, Sarah telephoned. The bill was taken care of, and I owed nothing!!! If you have questions or need help, please call StateWide.

For those considering **Medicaid Spend Down:** The benefits of **funeral pre-planning in** New York State were presented by representatives from the NYS Funeral Directors Association. Hopefully, a discussion of pre-planning funeral arrangements is held <u>at the time</u> that consideration is being given to a Medicaid Spend Down. When one prepays funeral expenses, that person still owns the money which is held in a trust. The trust is held by a third party so there are legal guarantees.

A question was raised: What if a private funeral home goes out of business or is bought out? The representatives answered that the money that is held in the trust is transferred to another funeral home of your choice. There is legal recourse (through the District Attorney and NYS Attorney General) on the rare occasion that a funeral home absconds with the funds, or the third party absconds with the trust money. The trust money can be transferred to another state. You also have the right to change your mind even after setting up the policy - for example, you decide you want to be cremated instead of having a burial.

Personal note from Jeanne: Funeral costs have continued to rise. Be aware that in pre-paying for a funeral, there may not be enough money in the trust to cover all of the preferences that the owner of the plan originally wanted so that adjustments may need to be made.
